SJTPO Wins National Road Safety Award

The South Jersey Transportation Planning Organization recently received a prestigious National Roadway Safety Award (see www.roadwaysafetyawards.org) for its Local Road Safety Audit (RSA) Program. The RSA Program began in 2004 with a pilot project sponsored by Cape May County. Roads with a significant crash history or potential are evaluated to identify low-cost, quick turnaround safety improvements. These measures, such as lighting, signage, signal upgrades, and striping, are eligible for federal safety funds as a result of being identified in the RSA's. The RSA Program is now in its third year. A notable feature of the Program is the interdisciplinary nature of the audit teams, which include county representatives, municipal police, engineering and public works staff, the state DOT, the NJ Division of Highway Traffic Safety, and the Federal Highway Administration.

SJTPO Reorganization

At its January 23rd Reorganization Meeting, the SJTPO Policy Board elected its 2006 officers. Cape May County Freeholder Director Daniel Beyel was named SJTPO Chairman for the eighth straight year. The Board also re-elected Atlantic County Freeholder Chairman Joseph F. Silipena as Vice-Chair, and Salem County Freeholder Charles R. Sullivan as Secretary/Treasurer. Both Silipena and Sullivan occupied the same posts in 2004 and 2005.

In addition, the following two members have been appointed to the Policy Board: Dr. Jerome M. Lutin, NJ Transit, and Robert W. Levy, Mayor, Atlantic City. Chairman Beyel thanked the Board for its support and looked forward to a challenging and exciting year.

Somers Point-Mays Landing Road Re-Construction Underway



Reconstruction is now underway on Somers Point – Mays Landing Road (CR559) in Somers Point, Atlantic County, between the Somers Point Circle and Route 9. This \$1.985 Million project will rebuild a seriously deteriorated section of CR 559, an important evacuation route from Ocean City and Somers Point. The road is frequently flooded, and the reconstruction

will raise it above the 100-year flood elevation. Sidewalks and bike – compatible shoulders will also be provided.

This project is another graduate of SJTPO's Scoping and Design programs, where federal funds are used to

advance complicated or environmentally sensitive projects for construction. The consultant firm of French & Parrello, Associates, of Holmdel, NJ, recently completed the extremely complex design, which involved coordination with a host of regulatory agencies. Atlantic County Freeholder Chairman Joseph Silipena, who also serves as SJTPO's Vice—Chairman, said "This

project certainly reflects our transportation priorities - especially safety, emergency evacuation, and keeping our roads in good shape. It's a real plus for our region". The current construction schedule calls for completion by Memorial Day.

chairs the SJTPO Policy Board, said, "We're extremely pleased with our audit program and the important role that Cape May County played in the process and we're grateful to the Federal Highway Administration for its support and recognition. We are committed to take the necessary steps to make our roads safer."

The SJTPO Road Safety Audit Program is one of the first local programs of its kind in the country, using federal planning funds to systemically identify local road segments of concern, conduct the audits, and secure funding for the recommended improvements. Audits have now been completed in all four counties, and SJTPO is working on getting safety improvements funded for the current federal fiscal year.

The Federal Highway Administration and the Roadway Safety Foundation present the bi-annual Roadway Safety Awards to programs and projects across the nation exhibiting excellence in roadway design, operations and planning. The Roadway Safety Foundation is a nonprofit charitable and educational organization dedicated to reducing the frequency and severity of motor vehicle crashes by improving the safety of America's roadways.

Policy Board Awards \$8.6 Million in Local Projects

On January 23, the SJTPO Policy Board approved funding for 14 South Jersey projects totaling over \$8.6 Million. These projects will be funded by SJTPO's allocation of federal Surface Transportation Program (STP) funds and include road resurfacing projects, highway design, and planning.

STP funds are typically used to improve federal-aid highways, or to conduct the studies needed to qualify more complex improvements for federal funding. The projects, known as "Local Leads", are managed by SJTPO's county and municipal members in cooperation with the NJ Department of Transportation.

According to SJTPO Chairman Daniel Beyel, "These projects are a vital part of our work in keeping our highway system safe and in good shape. I'd like to thank the members of the Policy Board for their cooperation in selecting next year's projects."

The Local Lead projects will be a key component of the 2007-2009 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). After a full draft TIP is prepared in the next few months, the Local Lead Projects and the full TIP, will be released for public comment.

WHAT CAUSES CRASHES?

Over the four year period of 2001-2004, nearly 149,000 vehicles were involved in crashes in the SJTPO region. Of all the vehicle crashes with an identified contributing circumstance (speeding, failure to yield, changing lanes, etc.), almost all can be classified as driver error or aggressive driving.

These driver-related issues are addressed by the South Jersey Traffic Safety Alliance (SJTSA), especially in such programs as the Defensive Driving course. SJTSA will continue to target these issues in its efforts to reduce crashes in our region.
